Anthony Coyne Answers Whence Recorder Questionnaire

Do you have a musical family? Yes, my wife Linda. She is an organist and harpsichordist. This means we play many baroque things in our home. My daughter is a flautist and my son is a percussionist.

Did you sing or play other instruments before you took up recorder? No.

Do you sing or play instruments other than recorder now? No. Years ago, I had a few piano lessons. The only enduring value of that was reading the bass clef. I think it is somewhat unusual to find a recorder player whose only instrument is the recorder.

Do you compose or arrange music? No.

Do you think there's any type of music that doesn't sound good on the recorder? I think anything could sound good. The key is to find an appropriate technique to make it work.

What's your approach to playing recorder? My goal is always to try to make the music sound so good you would want to hear it again and again. This means putting emphasis on sound quality and on interpretation. The hard part is that it often means ignoring what others do with the music and trying something else. Of course, that sets you up for an epic fail.

How do you find the time? I aim for small snatches of time. I am fortunate to have space to leave my recorders out so I can play them anytime I have a few minutes. I have never been able to devote extended periods of time to practice.

Do you have a teacher? No. I am too much of a delinquent for anyone to put up with me. I pick up clues wherever I go and try to make good use of them.

Do you play duets or in larger ensembles? Do you attend workshops?

I have been a regular workshop attendee for 25 years. I continue to be amazed at how much I have learned from every one of them. I have a few people I play with regularly, but I am always on the lookout for new opportunities.

Do you approach performance with enthusiasm or dread? Neither. Performance is a reality, and you just need to accept the reality that things are going to go wrong in live performance and just accept it. You can't be enthusiastic about your blunders, but you can learn not to dread them.

How long have you been a member of WRS? This is my third year. I was fortunate to know many of the WRS members from workshops. When we moved here, I knew where to go to find a recorder community.

Has membership benefited you in ways you didn't anticipate?

It is always good to get to know people better. I think the meet and greet time is vastly more valuable than we tend to think.

Do you have any good stories about meetings, recitals, or other group activities over the years? I still shudder over the time I was barely succeeding in playing a solo on a

program when the recorder I was playing exploded in my hands! And then there was the time the audience started throwing ice on us while we were playing! And then

Is there a performer—solo or group—that has inspired you throughout your recorder-playing life? I have had the opportunity to hear the (late) Flanders Quartet many times. Always inspirational.

What are your 3 favorite recordings featuring recorder? I guess I am showing my age, but anything by David Munrow. Close behind, recordings of Hans Martin Linde. And especially Dan Laurin's set of van Eyck.

If you were a castaway on a desert island, which one of your recorders would you hope you had with you? That's a tough one. Don't make me choose among my children.
